"Supporting People with Learning Disabilities"





Police Officers need to know how to support people with learning disabilities.



People with learning disabilities have the same rights as anyone else when they have contact with the Police.



There are also services to support people with learning disabilities when they have contact with the Police.



There are special laws to help people with learning disabilities if they have contact with the Police.



The Police should:



- Ask for an appropriate adult
 - An appropriate adult is not a Police Officer and cannot give legal advice



- An appropriate adult can help the person with a learning disability to:
 - Understand why they are being interviewed
 - Understand the questions the Police are asking



- An appropriate adult can help the Police to:
 - Speak to the person so that they can understand



Know when to stop the interview if the person finds it difficult



Ask if there is someone else who could support the person with a learning disability
